Maine Engineering Expo

The section had a booth adjacent to the UMaine ECE booth at the annual Maine Engineering Expo held this year at the University of Maine's New Balance Field House on February 24th. Booth traffic and interest was high.

The theme for our booth this year was the evolution of communications from Morse Code to high-frequency radio, to internet-connected remote communications, to software-defined radio. Display items includes a hand key with Heathkit code practice oscillator, a Yaesu HF-transceiver, an Echolink connected laptop with headset, and a laptop connected to the WebSDR server at the University of Twente, The Netherlands.

Approximately 30 persons attended a presentation by the Maine Turnpike Authority on their E-ZPass system. The turnpike team included Peter Mills, MTA Executive Director, Bill Yates, MTA IS Manager, and engineers Eric Barnes and Andrew Constantine.

Aside from presenting the technologies that make E-ZPass a success, they also demonstrated the so-called soft issues that must be addressed. For example, how to read a mud-covered license plate and fraud prevention. Judging by the many questions, the attendees found it very educational.

As a section we have been working toward integrating our activities over the past few years and this adds impetus to our work. IEEE History Projects

The IEEE has a program that recognizes ECE accomplishments. Do you know of a project in Maine or elsewhere in Region 1 that is worthy of recognition? It does not need to be a recent project.

For example, this fall the IEEE will recognize with a plaque the French Cable Office in Orleans MA -- decades after it ceased operations! The cable began operation in the late 1800s and at the cable head in Orleans it was where news from Europe was first known in the United States -- such as when



Lindbergh landed in Paris. Much of the original equipment from operational days is still there.
